## **Course Description**

Design 203 Digital Tools is an exploration of the processes of design, in terms of germination, ideation, and execution of design solutions to assigned design problems; this will be integrated with the acquisition of basic computer design skills that will be necessary to successfully solve the assigned design problems. The computer skills learned are integral to a professional career in the design world today. Instruction will include class lectures and outside research. Students will be given exercises and projects to be completed outside and in class so access to a computer outside of class, with the relevant software, will be required.

## **Learning Objectives**

1. To raise awareness of design and its implementation
2. To develop perceptual skills for visual communication
3. To raise the awareness of the computer and various peripherals as important tools for designers

**Co-Requisite:** DES 102 Design Fundamentals

## Course Notes

Students are expected to attend all classes and to arrive on time for all classes. Attendance will be taken and will impact grade. This course is divided into lectures, critiques, and limited studio time. Students are expected to complete research, exercises, and projects outside of the class period – a complete listing of computer labs and hours on campus will be provided. Mutual respect in the classroom is critical. Critique is a central component of design practice. Criticism will be constructive and is a response to the appropriateness of the idea and not the dignity of the individual. It is imperative to meet the deadlines given. Every class session that a project is late the student will be penalized one letter grade (10%) of the total project grade.
